While the parade starts at 12:30 p.m., we need to assemble by 10:30 a.m.


The assembly point will likely be eastbound Wacker Drive between Clark St. and Dearborn St. It would be best to enter the assembly area from the west.

Alfa's 3rd Quarter Sales Down 29%

On Tuesday, FCA US LLC reported its 3rd quarter sales results. Total sales declined by 20% year over year while total market share increased from 7.2% in July to 8% by the end of September. Inventory decreased by 50,000 units. The company reports that it instituted aggressive incentive program in the quarter which will continue through the end of the year to prepare dealers for the 2025 models.

Alfa Romeo 3rd quarter sales were down 29% year over year and down 10% for the year to date versus 2023. The line's biggest seller was the Tonale, which sold 1,122 units in the quarter. The badge-engineered Dodge Hornet sold 3,848 units in the quarter. A total of 1,296 of them were the hybrid Hornet R/T, which was 5th among the top selling hybrid vehicles in the U.S.

If you're in the market for a new Alfa Romeo, this might be the time to commit. Local dealers are offering \$3,000-\$8,000 discounts from MSRP on most cars in their inventories. In addition, if you are in the market for a PHEV Tonale, you will be able to take advantage of \$11,000 in tax credits, a point Palmen Motors of Kenosha is eager to make in its vehicle listings.

Now, contrast the news above with posts that have hit the internet in the last two weeks about the 2025 Alfa lineup. According to Carscoops.com,

Alfa's 2025 lineup is being "gutted" and getting "huge price hikes." A kinder interpretation would be that model selection has been simplified. Although MSRPs of the "base" Giulia and Stelvio have increased by \$4,515 and \$5,245, respectively, the level of standard equipment has also improved and pricing is still competitive with equivalent BMW models. In addition, based on Stellantis' present sales situation, it's likely that healthy incentives will remain in place.

A visit to the 2025 Alfa Romeo configuration site confirms that the Giulia and Stelvio Ti and Veloce model names are no more. Base models are still available in either RWD and AWD. Veloce is now an available trim package which adds a sunroof, sports steats, limited slip differential, front strut tower brace and blackout body kit with rear diffuser. The brown upholstery option has been dropped, but red leather seating is still available. The only other optional packages are active driver assist and premium interior and audio. That's it.

Each model will have a "Tributo Italiano" model, essentially an "all the bells and whistles" model, with the only option being the active driver assist package, and available colors of red, white, and the new for 2025, Verde Fangio Metallic. This model will be a "limited edition." Tonale will have a similar model lineup and options list. It is expected that the all BEV 2026 Stelvio will arrive late next year.

Why the Alfa Romeo GTV6 Is Pornography for Engineers

The Alfa Romeo GTV6 is so much more than a pretty face. Underneath its skin, this car is pornography for engineers, and here's why.



In 1980, the Alfa Romeo Alfetta GTV6 came out with a 60° V6 engine from the Alfa 6, fitted on a shortened Alfetta chassis. A transaxle, De Dion rear suspension, and Watts parallelogram linkage worked away together at the back, with wishbone suspension up front. The front brakes had ventilated discs, and the rears were inboard. Even its front camber was increased significantly to reduce understeer, over models fitted with a 4-cylinder engine.

Did you tune out? Here's a three-word recap: it is athletic.

The history of motorsport agrees. The GTV6 won the European Touring Car Championship from 1982 to 1985 against Audi, BMW, and Jaguar. It won the BTCC with Andy Rouse, then France, Italy, Australia...winning everywhere. It plunged into rally with the crazy French ace Yves Loubet, winning its class



four years in succession from 1983 to 1986 in the Tour de Corse.

Its 2,500-cc, 160 horsepower, 0-60 in 8 seconds, and 128 mph top speed is quick enough to make a Porsche 911 SC driver nervous. As a plus, Giorgetto Giugiaro from the newborn Italdesign consultancy drew a totally new line for a four-person GT. Hello, Audi A7, Alfa Romeo did it 40 years ago.

Then you start shifting gears and think: "How is it even possible they worsened the perfect Giulia gearbox with the Alfetta?" On your way down to second gear in the examples I've driven, you have to be a good old school manual master if you don't want to scrape something. This makes it even more of a professional car in my opinion—or maybe that's just describing a complaint as a strength.



It's rewarding to learn to extract the most from the car, but if you wanna go faster through the gears, stay with the older

Giulia and GT versions. (It's a shame the older cars had no V6 engine. Maybe I should build one with a 3.2-litre GTA engine? In Italy, it's already been done.)

The first two things I love to notice when approaching to the GTV6 are the scent of its interior, which is petrol, wood, and that unique Alfa Romeo smell. Then I enjoy the noise of the door closing from inside. It's a ritual: sit down, close the door with that nice old sound, take a few breaths, and turn the key.

Then, ok, the show starts: Giuseppe Busso's violin. There is a specific note this engine can reach, around 5,000 rpm, that is an audible injection of endorphins. Every time, my mind gets drugged when I keep the right foot on that precise note for long enough.

I'm already organizing another test with a very mean and obscure GTV6, only with a tuned engine and approximately 240 horsepower, done in an all black livery and wide body. It goes to show that these cars are still alive—ask the MiTo and Fiat 500 Abarth drivers who tried to pass me during the drive back.

The youngbloods had no idea what they were in for when flying along in formation with this old, gray, loud, and weirdly-shaped car. Now they have.

1000 Miglia Revives Pre-war Figure 8 Route for 2025 Tour de Corse

In 2025, the 1000 Miglia will throw back to the days before the Second World War by racing on a figure 8-style course inspired by the routes used in its early history.

Since its revival in 1977, the race primarily ran a single loop, though the orientation varied each year. For example, the 2023 edition ran clockwise before going counter-clockwise in 2024.

The 2025 race will start in Brescia, from which the route goes clockwise through San Lazzaro di Savena. After that, the route breaks through the Apennines mountains and crosses the Raticosa and Futa passes into Prato. From Prato, the race travels southwards before arriving in Rome to mark the end of the second leg.



The third leg brings the event back north on the way to Cervia and Milano Marittima in Emilia-Romagna. Leg #4 turns competitors southwest where they will cross Prato once againthereby completing the figure 8's "overpass" en route to Empoli; a run along the coast takes everyone to Parma. The fifth and final leg concludes the race from Parma back to Brescia.

A figure 8 format was used by the original Mille Miglia from the inaugural edition in 1927 to 1938. World War II halted the race afterwards save for a one-off in 1940, which adopted a traditional loop course that became the norm following the war. The Mille Miglia continued with this layout until its cancellation after 1957, and it remained upon being revived as a vintage race twenty years later.

The 1000 Miglia in its current form is reserved for vehicles whose models, if not the cars themselves, ran the original Mille Miglia from 1927 to 1957. Andrea Vesco and Fabio Salvinelli are the defending winners, having won every edition since 2021 in their 1929 Alfa Romeo 6C 1750 SS Spider Zagato.
