The Mystery of the Missing Alfa, Continued

Last month's report on the stolen 8C2900 raised some interesting questions. Tom Heinrich wrote the following:

"...crazy story on the 8C 2900. How does one "profit" from the theft of such a vehicle? You could never sell it as it would be such a well-known car that no one would touch it. Unless it were sold to Russia or some-such. And 5 months later the owner finally pub-

lishes a reward. And it's \$50,000 on a \$23,000,000.00 vehicle? I mean...throw a couple hundred thousand out there and stir things up. And, no tracker on a \$23,000,000.00 vehicle? Wow, that is pretty dumb. I might get one for my lowly Giulietta."

I responded:

I had many of the same thoughts. There are a couple of different scenarios. One is that the thieves were actually after the truck and trailer as there were other similar thefts from the same hotel in previous months. Locals looking for nice trailers to steal and sell? Inside job? VERY unlucky car transporters?

Another possibility is that the thieves actually knew what they were doing and were hired by someone who really wanted the car. There have been thefts of priceless paintings that were never recovered or recovered only after the death of the larcenous owner. Why not steal a priceless car and hide it in your garage to be privately admired? Weird but possible.

But why no tracker? Good question and hard to explain. If you see a dually pickup with unmarked trailer on the road do you think "ah, a priceless collector car?" I think the transporters were going for the stealth factor. What could possibly go wrong? I understand the reward was being offered by the insurance company—someone's insurance company. I'm

sure the claims process makes another interesting story. I tried hard to find a follow-up story, but so far, crickets.

John Draneas, the *Sports Car Market* "Legal Files" correspondent, wrote on the theft in the February 2023 issue of the magazine. He maintains that the car, best of show winner at the 2000 Amelia Island Concours d'Elegance, was not the target of the theft. Rather, the thieves were after the truck and trailer, items easily and quickly resold. Local detective Sara Albarri stated that three other similar vehicle and trailer thefts had occurred at or near that same Holiday Inn Express in recent months, and there had been a string of other similar thefts in the area, which was near a local racetrack. The thieves were pros. Although they were captured on the hotel's security cameras at about 2 a.m., their faces were obscured and the whole process took mere seconds from the time they unlocked the passenger side door.

The car, showing its age since its past glory, was headed to a Florida restorer for a refresh. The owner's collection manager stated, "Only three people in the world knew what was inside that trailer and the thieves had no tine to get inside and look." The perpetrators no doubt had a big surprise when they opened it up. Possibilities for fencing the stolen car or its parts ranged from few to none. With only five longwheelbase cars in existence, anyone interested in buying the car or its parts would know immediately where it came from. Mr. Draneas suggests that the best option may be for one of the thieves' cronys to miraculously "find" the missing car and claim the reward. The insurance company has already paid the claim and now owns the car, but the former owner retains the right to purchase it back if it is recovered.

The owner was no doubt depending on "stealth" to protect his shipment, however fate intervened. Who knew Latta, South Carolina, was a hot spot for truck/ trailer theft? There may be a lesson here. Draneas suggests it would be prudent to employ some readily available and simple tech solutions to protect our collector cars. He suggests concealing an Apple AirTag, discoverable using Apple's "Find My" app (I've used them to track luggage.), but there are some limitations, especially if you're not an iPhone user. Alternately, a device called "LandAirSea Asset Protection," uses the GPS network to locate objects. He says it's a little more expensive than the AirTag and requires a monthly subscription, but may be more effective. This month, Sports Car Market carries a two page ad for the device—a coincidence, I'm sure.

AM Radio Missing in New EVs

According to a recent article in *The New York Times*, cited in *Morning Brew*, AM radios are being squeezed out of electric vehicles. Many EV manufacturers no longer include AM radio in their cars, citing electromagnetic interference that causes noise and static.

Tesla, Volvo, Porsche, Audi, and some Volkswagen EVs already come without AM radio; likewise the 2023 Ford F-150 Lightning pickup. While technological solutions to make EVs and AM radio compatible do exist, car manufacturers might not bother. Only 20% of U.S. radio audiences listen to AM radio and those listeners tend to be an older demographic.

What this means for the future of AM radio is unclear. Many AM stations are reliant on drive-time listeners, and while some already simulcast on FM that option may not be financially viable for many stations. While it's unlikely that AM service would disappear entirely, the business picture for AM broadcasting looks cloudy.

Its possible the government could come to the "rescue." Senator Ed Markey (D-MA) recently requested that automakers avoid depriving drivers of AM radio. Markey claims that AM waves help government officials communicate with the public, particularly during emergencies, according to *Morning Brew*.

An Andretti-Cadillac Formula One Entry?

Today, January 5, Michael Andretti announced: "Andretti Global has partnered with General Motors to pursue an Expression of Interest to join Formula 1. "I'm really proud to be able to be a part of this fellow American company in this pursuit of the opportunity to join Formula 1. GM and Andretti both have a strong history in racing, and I believe that together we have a lot to offer."

It is unlikely that the team would be allowed to field an entry before 2026 as the registration deadline for 2024 powerplants has already passed. The existing 10 teams are not eager to allow more entrants, but FIA President Mohammed Ben Sulayem is lending his support for the formula's orderly expansion.

The team plans a thoroughly American effort, including cars and drivers, with an American headquarters (likely in Indiana).

A new Alfa supercar, that is. Media sites in Italy, U.K., and the U.S. are abuzz with news of the new Alfa to be revealed in March. However, there is little to no consensus on what, exactly, we will see at the reveal.

Correspondents think they see a teasing taillight in the closing frames of Alfa's 2023

New year's greeting. Is that a "6" and a "C" we are seeing? Will the new car be called the 6C?

Maybe, maybe not.



For sure, we are told, it will be the limited edition (maybe 100 copies) "halo" offering Alfa CEO Jean-Philippe Imparato has promised publicly. It will be a *CAR* and not an SUV. It will be expensive (over \$200K) and suited for both street and track. Beyond that we don't know much for sure.

It could be based on the Maserati MC20 platform—or definitely not, but possibly on the Georgio chassis.

It will be a 500+ hp biturbo V6 from Maserati, or from Alfa, or possibly a high output EV, or maybe a hybrid.

It could resemble the one-off Giulia SWB Zagato coupe or be a completely new design inspired by the 33 Stradale. Or it could be an open car, reviving the Duetto name.

All of these hypotheses have been aired and any combination of outcomes seems possible. Could it be that Alfa itself doesn't know yet? I hope they do! March isn't all that far away. Stay tuned.

Alfa's 2022 U.S. Sales Down 30% vs '21

Stellantis recently reported its 2022 U.S. sales figures, which were down 13% in aggregate from 2021. The Alfa Romeo brand declined 30%. It sold a total of 12,845 units for the year, versus 18,250 in 2021. Stelvios outsold Giulias 7,752 to 5,092. If you're thinking about buying something new, you might surf on over to your local dealer's website. There are deals to be found.

Zagato Builds a Giulia Coupe

Remember that new Giulia coupe you were hoping would follow the sedan? Alfa never got around to fulfilling your dreams. They were too busy designing SUVs. (They never built the sport wagon I wanted, either.) Well, Zagato stepped up and built one, and only one, as an exercise commemorating their 100 years of collaboration with Alfa Romeo. The project kicked off in 2021, the centenary year, and was shown as a finished project just before Christmas 2022. Although Zagato worked closely with the Alfa Romeo design office, the design and production were entirely theirs.




The custom coupe is based on the Giulia Quadrifoglio sedan, but with a shortened wheelbase. The mechanicals were upgraded to GTAm specifications and the transmission is a six-speed manual. The striking carbon fiber body carries many Zagato design cues, a distillation of the house's greatest hits, including a double-bubble roof line, chopped tail, and lines from the TZ and other Alfa/Zagto collaborations from years past. This is not to say it's a "retro" design. Zagato had its sights set firmly on the future.

The lucky customer was a wealthy German collector, an Alfista as well as a Zagato and Aston Martin aficionado, known to the carrozzeria due to his ownership of Zagato-styled Astons. The price was not given, but it's thought to be in excess of \$200,000.

What Does TI Mean, Anyway?

That question was asked recently on the AlfaBB. The poster was not satisfied with the answer he received, which of course was "Turismo Internazionale." He wanted to see a document from Alfa Romeo that spelled out the name with respect to a series-105 sedan. No one was able to produce such a document because the car was simply named



"Giulia TI." It was never identified as a "Giulia Turismo Internazionale."

But where did the "TI" designation come from? From auto racing, and more specifically Italian auto racing. The story goes that in the immediate post-WWII period, racers of Italian sedans in the touring (Turismo) class found themselves at a disadvantage relative to entries from other countries. A little rule juggling was exercised, producing a new racing class dubbed "Turismo Internazionale." Although the name suggested a class with an international reach, the new regulations so favored the Italian marques that hardly any "foreign" manufacturer bothered to enter. Thus, Italian cars and drivers swept the class.

The first Alfa to be dubbed T.I. was the 1953 1900 T.I.: "Destined mainly for competition use and designed to keep pace with Lancia whose Aurelia saloons were increasingly threatening, Alfa Romeo specially prepared 572 examples of the 1900 berlina, creating very competitive cars for the Turismo Internazionale category, hence the T.I. initials." (Quoted from d'Amico & Tabucchi)

In 1957, the slightly faster 2nd version of the original Giulietta sedan was dubbed the TI. By 1962 when the Giulia was introduced, TI had become a common model designation and was subsequently applied to the sportier versions of many of Alfa's models, right down to today's Giulia and Stelvio Ti.

Similar stories can be told about the origin of "GT" and "GTI," as both were derived from racing classes. But that's another story.




For Sale
