35,000 Pre-Orders for Tonale in U.S.



Alfa is ramping up production at the Pomigliano factory to 400 per day in response to the demand in the U.S. and Eu-

rope. According to the Italian press, U.S. pre-orders for the Tonale stand at 35,000 units. Pre- orders for the Dodge Hornet, produced on the same line, amount to 14,000. Tonale deliveries are now projected to begin in May. 🚓

What's Next in the Pipeline?

The frequently-interviewed Alfa Romeo CEO, Jean-Phillipe Imparato, in his latest session with L'Argus magazine at the Paris Retromobile show, discussed the marque's plans for introducing one new model per The high bid for this piece of Alfa Romeo's U.S. racyear through 2030. A new and as yet unnamed Bsegment SUV will be announced this September. The vehicle, to be produced in Tychy, Poland, is slated for 2024 introduction. The new vehicle will share a platform with Jeep and Fiat products and won't be imported, as it is thought to be too small to be successful in the U.S.

The next generation Giulia, slated for introduction in 2025, will be an exclusively battery-electric model. According to U.S. Alfa honcho Larry Dominique, the new electric-only Giulia will have a 400-mile range and be capable of recharging in 18 minutes. Power options will range from 350 to 800 hp.

The new Giulia will be followed by the updated electric Stelvio in 2026, using the same STLA Large platform as the Giulia. Next up, in 2027, a larger flagship model is projected. Some say the model could be named GTV and be a sedan, intended to compete with the Porsche Taycan. Other sources say it will be an SUV aimed at the BMW X5 buyer.

Dominique also stated that Alfa will have another offering in the C-segment, alongside the Tonale, in the U.S. There is speculation that it will be the successor to the recently discontinued Giulietta sedan which was never sold here.

In the more immediate future, the limited production sportscar scheduled for a spring reveal will get a go/

no-go decision in April, and in June an announcement will be made concerning Alfa's participation in motorsports. The brand's dedication to the sport is not in question, only the venue. It may choose to remain in Formula 1 or perhaps participate in prototype racing.

ing history was \$350,000, not enough for the present owner to let it go. This was the very car, driven by Horst Kwech, that won the final SCCA Trans-Am Two Five Challenge race of the 1971 season at Laguna Seca and was disqualified post-race on a technicality, handing the series win to John Morton's Datsun 510. With impeccable provenance and a detailed restoration by GTA guru Roman Tucker, this was the car to have if you are a (well-off) fan of the Trans-Am series. The comments section of the auction (here) brought forth some knowledgeable comments and a wealth of historical information on the car and the series.

Las Vegas F1 Race Locked Through 2032

First it was Austin, then Miami, now Las Vegas three U.S. races on the new-age F1 calendar certainly a boon for new U.S. Formula 1 fans. This isn't the first time the series has been in Las Vegas. In 1981 and '82, the series ran on a track laid out in the Caesars Palace parking lot. They were not exciting races. This year promises more, much more, with cars hitting over 200 mph down Las Vegas Boulevard, past all the high end casinos. According to Autoweek.com, the city fathers project that the November 18 inaugural event will generate \$1.2 billion for the region, so why shouldn't they extend the contract through 2032?

The Tour du Peloponnese Vintage Auto Rally By Wayne Toberman, CAROC Member

ance during a midnight TdP 2022 planning meeting at registered a trendy bistro on September 24, 2022, just 90 Internation minutes after I deplaned in Athens from Crete. Teams.

As someone very involved with FIA's European auto events accreditation, his words, relating to the running of the 9th consecutive Tour du Peloponnese (TdP), were meant to be taken as absolute fact rather than as a casual late-night observation.

At a time when sanctioned auto rallies across Europe have been over-regulated by accreditation agencies and host countries, too often reduced to little more than Point A to Point B to Point C events, the TdP, given Greece's unique, often guardrail-free road networks, and lack of national travel restrictions governing such events, is unique. This same opinion was echoed continuously by journalists, media personalities, and auto rally aficionados across Europe.

Whenever something appears too good to be true when proposed, one or all past experiences often win out and whatever "it" is, often is! And so this opportunity was received with skepticism by most except our CAROC president Dennis Sbertolli, who supported my follow-on contacts after I first surfaced the opportunity to partake in this event to him and our members .

At the time, given the far-flung distance to travel, expenses—perceived and actual—involved, the highly restrictive and ever changing COVID situation, and other unknowns, as the registration deadline for TdP 2021 neared, CAROC member participation plans simply bogged down. Then finally, during a Thursday night Avanti Café meeting, very good-natured banter turned into a statement by one or more saying if it was such a good deal, "to put my money where my mouth was!"

Which I did!

Two year ago, while serving as a CAROC Board Member, I was contacted by John Papanikolaouas, CEO of the Triskelion Group, the TdP organizing agency. I have remained in close coordination ever since, culminating in my participation as driver, with another Alfisiti, Frank Tabor of Chicago, as our navi-

gator, in the TdP 2022. We were the only purely American team in a field of 70 registered International Teams.

This turned out to be an opportunity

of a lifetime! John took care of us, and true to his word, made available, free of charge, for our use as CAROC members (Frank had applied previously years ago), our choice of 6 vintage rally cars maintained by the Group for select international participants. In our case, we chose the 1978 Datsun B180 rally car with 122,000 kms of experience under its bonnet. A wise choice, because after six grueling days and a night, and over 1,000 kilometers of adrenaline stoked competition, we ended up placing third in our class—a nearly unknown occurrence for first time participants!

We experienced road closing rock-slides, detours onto nearly impassible dirt or gravel cow or goat paths spiraling down from 3,000 foot-plus elevations, constant blind curves every few minutes of every 6-8

hour day, glorious ever changing scenery from valleys to mountain tops to sea views, visiting places we only heard or read about in the history books of our youth including Sparta, Olympia, Argos, and more!

The participants stayed in 5-star spa resorts, fortresses, or castles nightly, with everyone, almost 200 in total, dining together nightly in near medieval settings all the while bonding and sharing experiences in over

a dozen languages and sets of international gestures.



Mealtime

Alfas amounted to about 30% of the field, followed by vintage Jags, Porsches, Mercedes, Citroens, Audis, and even a 1929 Canary Yellow Ford Model A with 29,000 original miles, in original showroom condition, formerly

belonging to the King of Belgium's private collection!



It was once told to me during travels to Cappadocia, Turkey, that "you arrived here at our boutique hotel a stranger, but you leave family!" The same is true of the TdP rally participants.

Over 60% are repeats, hailing from as far away as Australia. Conversations at the first pre-rally evening's mixer ranged from catching up on family gossip, to news from home, to which business takeover was in the works, to whose castle was getting a new tennis court out of some state-of-the-art material. The latest rally computers or android apps, and who bought whose car from the previous year were covered. By the end of the 7th day, everyone was heard making plans with each other for meeting up for next year's event.



Registration for the TdP 2023, beginning October 1, is now open. CAROC/AROC members once again have their choice of 6 free rally cars from the Triskelion Group garage for pickup in Athens.

Car pickup requires a pre-confirmation of your team's reserved car and an International Drivers License, available from your local AAA office. You must claim your car two days before the start of the rally.

Plan to arrive in Athens at least 3 days prior to the start date. Pre-

rally lodging is your responsibility. For those with a World of Hyatt membership, the Hyatt Theoxenia Palace & House Suites on the far north side of the city (nearby the pickup point for your rally car) is the absolute best deal in town, whether using points or dollars!

Tour costs are as follows: A €3,700 (~\$3,972) per crew registration fee, air fare to Greece (British Air from Chicago to Athens is currently the best option), and fuel and oil expenses for the rally. The fee for the 7-day event includes double occupancy 5-star resort accommodations, lunch, and dinner (alcohol and wine excluded), and enroute maintenance support from rally contact maintenance teams, plus coordination support pre-, during-, and post-rally. A single supplement is available. Other optional costs are listed on the entry form.

The best thing to do if interested, is to view the Official 19-minute "<u>Tour du Peloponnese 2022</u>" video on YouTube to get a very clear picture of what's involved and what to expect—or not. Alfa Romeo C43 F1 Car Revealed

On Tuesday, February 7, Alfa Romeo Racing revealed their entry in the 2023 F1 series. The car's profile has been reconfigured to promote better airflow for improved aerodynamics and cooling. Sauber technical director Jan Monchaux is said to have drawn on the 2022 championship-winning Red Bull RB18 for inspiration on the new design. Last season, cooling system problems contributed to half of Alfa's ten retirements, so fixes in that area were an area of particular focus. Cooling surfaces were positioned more toward the rear of the car, requiring significant changes to the rear suspension, the area that underwent the most mechanical revision.



Sponsorship has changed. Orlen has moved on and gambling site Stake is now the named sponsor. Livery has changed from red and white to black and white. Former driver and F1 commentator Martin Brundle thinks the new livery will be hard to see on TV and in low visibility situations.

Sauber/Alfa Romeo will be auctioning the launch chassis built for the model reveal by F1 Authentics. The auction valuation is projected to be in excess of \$480,000. Bid early, bid often.

Another Year, Another Centennial

Plus a diamond anniversary and more supercar speculation



This year marks the 100th anniversary of the first use of the Quadrifoglio on an Alfa Romeo race car. It was the RL raced by Ugo Sivocci June 25, 1923, in the Targa Florio. The Alfa Romeo Styling Center created a special version of the "clover" to commemorate

the event, and the museum will be presenting a spe-

cial exhibit as well.



This is also the 60th, i.e. diamond, anniversary of the founding of Autodelta by Carlo Chitti and the Chizzola brothers, March 5,1963. In 1965, it took on the racing development of

the Giulia TZ and effectively became Alfa's racing arm, developing the GTA, Tipo 33, and shepherding the return to Formula 1 racing, until its absorption and renaming as Alfa Corse in 1983. Alfa Centro Style also created an anniversary emblem for them (above),

The Italian auto magazine *Quattroruote* is convinced that one or both of these emblems will appear on the much-anticipated supercar which, they say, will be named the 33 Stradale, in homage to the original Tipo 33 Stradale. This would be fitting and largely appropriate, although the 33 name was also used for the final rendition of the Alfasud platform. It sold close to a million units in its 11-year run (1983-1995). The question is whether European Alfisti will think of the original 33 Stradale, a candidate for the most beautiful car produced, or the model 33, a capable, but definitely non-supercar offering.

Chicago Auto Show Expands Footprint More floorspace, fewer automakers



The 115th edition of the Chicago Auto Show is now underway, running through February 20. The venerable show, billed as the largest auto show in North America, has had a rough couple of years. After a successful 2020 show, completed before Covid shut the world down, the 2021 show was first postponed, then finally moved to July, with a reduced, one

week run. Last year, the show returned to its traditional February dates, but with a much-reduced footprint.

This year, floorspace has expanded to both halls in the north and south buildings of McCormick Place, but many brands failed to return after their Covid hiatus. Instead, the added floor space has been given over to test tracks and auto-related vendor space. All the major brands have a ride-along track while Ford and Stellantis have two. Commonwealth Edison has one (Chicago Drives Electric) exclusively to show off battery electric vehicles (BEVs). Missing are many of the high-end brands. You can ride in a Lyriq but that is the only Cadillac being shown. Although BMW has a small space, there is no Mercedes presence. Likewise nothing from Volvo, Mini, Porsche, Jaguar, Land Rover, Infiniti, Lincoln, Maserati, and others. It remains to be seen whether some of these marques will return in future years. It could be that the expense of mounting a display no longer provides an adequate return on investment.

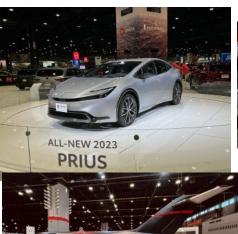
The Stellantis group occupies a large area in the south hall, with all brands sharing a common space. Ram and Jeep take up the most space with their separate demo tracks and the largest variety of models on display. Alfa is showing a single green Tonale, with little fanfare. (The sister Dodge Hornet has a larger sign.) The Tonale is sandwiched between one each Giulia and Stelvio Quadrifoglio models. Gone are the days when Alfa had its own fancy stamd. I couldn't even find an Alfa rep to discuss the delivery schedule. Next door to the Alfas are a sprinkling of Fiat 500X models, the last of the U.S. line for now. Around the corner are two Dodge Hornets, one a cooking model in an unappealing shade of blue-gray, and the other, a tricked out GLH concept in black. There are a couple of Dodge Charger concepts. The company hasn't brought a Chrysler 300 that I noticed, but the BEV Chrysler Airflow concept car is striking and not coincidentally shows a family resemblance to the Tonale/ Hornet.

So, in my opinion, this year's Chicago Auto Show, while improved over last year's offering, has a long way to go to regain its past glory. Let's hope it does, rather than succumbing to the virtual world.

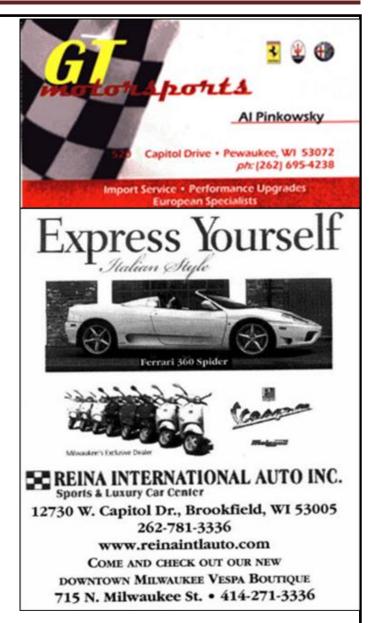
